An Act to extend the Jurisdiction and improve the Practice of the High Court of Admiralty. [17th May 1861.]

WHEREAS it is expedient to extend the Jurisdiction and improve the Practice of the High Court of Admiralty of England: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows:

1, This Act may be cited for all Purposes as "The Admiralty Court Act, 1861."

The High Court of Admiralty shall have Jurisdiction over any Claim by a Seaman of any Ship for Wages earned by him on board the Ship, whether the same be due under a special Contract or otherwise, and also over any Claim by the Master of any Ship for Wages earned by him on board the Ship, and for Disbursements made by him on account of the Ship: Provided always, that if in any such Cause the Plaintiff do not recover Fifty Pounds, he shall not be entitled to any Costs, Charges, or Expenses incurred by him therein, unless the Judge shall certify that the Cause was a fit one to be

33. In any Cause in the High Court of Admiralty Bail may be taken to answer the Judgment : well of the said Court as of the Court of Appeal, and the said High Court of Admiralty may withhold the Release of any Property under its Arrest until such Bail has been given; and in any Appeal from any Decree or Order of the High Court of Admiralty the Court of Appeal may make and enforce its Order against the Surety or Sureties who may have signed any such Bail Bond in the same Manner as if the Bail had been given in the Court of Appeal.

34. The High Court of Admiralty may, on the Application of the Defendant in any Cause of Damage, and on his instituting a Cross Cause for the Damage sustained by him in respect of the same Collision, direct that the Principal Cause and the Cross Cause be heard at the same Time and upon the same Evidence; and if in the Principal Cause the Ship of the Defendant has been arrested or Security given by him to answer Judgment, and in the Cross Cause the Ship of the Plaintiff cannot be arrested, and Security has not been given to answer Judgment therein, the Court may, if it think fit, suspend the Proceedings in the Principal Cause, until Security has been given to answer Judgment in the Cross

HEREAS an Act was passed in the Twenty-second and Twenty-third Years of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled An Act to afford Facilities for the more certain Ascertainment of the Law administered in one Part of Her Majesty's Dominions when pleaded in the Courts of another Part thereof: And whereas it is expedient to afford the like Facilities for the better Ascertainment, in similar Circumstances, of the Law of any Foreign Country or State with the Government of which Her Majesty may be pleased to enter into a Convention for the Purpose of mutually ascertaining the Law of such Foreign Country or State when pleaded in Actions depending in any Courts within Her ' Majesty's Dominions and the Law as administered in any Part of Her Majesty's Dominions when ' pleaded in Actions depending in the Courts of such Foreign Country or State:' Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the Authority of the same, as follows; viz.,
